Adam Zickerman began his legal career in 2001 at the Office of the Attorney General in Lansing, Michigan. In 2002, he became Deputy Attorney with the Apache County Attorney's Office in Arizona. He served in the position for three years before transitioning to the Coconino County Attorney's Office in Flagstaff where he was responsible for handling violent crime, sex crimes, and special prosecutions. In 2010, he left the county attorney's office and briefly worked in private practice. In 2012, he returned to prosecution and

became an Assistant U.S. Attorney for the District of Arizona, specializing in violent crimes, sex crimes, drug offenses, and homicides.

Zickerman left the U.S. Attorney's office in 2016 and founded his own private practice. He has taught courses for the National District Attorney Association, National Center for the Prosecution of Child Abuse, the Arizona Prosecuting Attorney Advisory Council, and the Arizona Homicide Investigation Association. Between 2006 and 2010, he taught paralegal and administration of justice programs at Coconino Community College. He is currently an adjunct professor at Northern Arizona University where he teaches criminal law and criminal procedure. He holds a BS in criminal justice and English from Northern Arizona University and a JD from Western Michigan University.
