Jeff LeDuff began his law enforcement career in 1982 as an officer for the Baton Rouge Police Department in Louisiana. He worked his way up the ranks of the department and was named Chief in 2004 after 22 years of service. As Chief, he served as an advisory council member on the ICare program, which provided prevention education to students in public, parochial, and private schools concerning alcohol, tobacco, narcotics, violence, and crisis response. His efforts to strengthen relationships with the community led to the creation of a summer

academy designed to introduce youths to the police department.

In 2010, LeDuff retired from policing. He currently consults on safety and self-defense training for individuals and businesses. He is a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (F.B.I.) National Academy and attended both the F.B.I.'s Law Enforcement Administration Development School and the National Executive Institute of Law Enforcement Management Training.
